

From a Spider Monkey Sanctuary in Cancún to a full-day excursion to Celestún Natural Reserve, you will never look at the Yucatan the same.

#### Mérida

For centuries, Mérida was isolated from the rest of Mexico by the surrounding mountains and jungles. Today, you'll encounter a rich mix of cultural and architectural influences from Spain, France and even New Orleans. A local guide will take you to the lavish Government Palace. Inside, 27 murals by painter Fernanco Castro Pacheco bring to life the hard-fought history of the Yucatán. Adjacent to the palace, notice the lemon-colored St. Ildefenso's cathedral, built partially from the stones of Mayan temples destroyed by the conquistadores. Then, travel to the ancient Mayan city of Uxmal (pronounced "ooshmahl"). Although its name means "thrice built," Uxmal was actually rebuilt at least five times, with many parts dating from the 6th century.

#### Chichén Itzá

Journey through the Yucatán to the sacred Mayan city of Chichén Itzá, mysteriously abandoned in the 7th century A.D. One of antiquity's most spectacular ceremonial centers was built here, dedicated to Chac, god of rain. Gaze up at the 365 steps of the mighty pyramid of El Castillo, which once served as a giant calendar more accurate than our own. On your guided tour, learn about a perilous ball court game (a possible forerunner to soccer) that the Maya played here. Players could not touch the ball with their hands because all round objects were considered holy. Some scientists believe this explains why the wheel was never developed in the area.

#### Tulum

Protected by steep sea cliffs on one side and an imposing 16-foot-high wall around the rest of it, this ancient Mayan city managed to fend off attacks by the Spaniards until the 16th century. Within Tulum, you'll find fascinating ruins in a spectacular setting overlooking the Caribbean Sea. A temple as well as a fortress, Tulum honors del Dios Descendente, the god who descends from the heavens. See his upsidedown image carved in stone on the impressive El Castillo (the castle). Can you see the carved remnants of the rain god Chaac on the cornice of the Temple of the Frescoes?

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
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
