DAY 1: FLY OVERNIGHT TO JAPAN

DAY 2: TOKYO

Welcome to Tokyo, capital of Japan since 1868. You're greeted at the airport by your specially trained Language Immersion Program Director, who will be with you throughout your tour. Tokyo, which translates to "East Capital," was originally a fishing village named Edo. The city has the most populous metropolitan area in the world, which helps explain why its rail system is the world's busiest. Meticulous public parks, giant electronics stores, and countless noodle shops are just a few of the reasons why Tokyo is often considered one of the world's most vibrant, unique, and extravagant cities.

DAY 3: TOKYO

- Take an expertly guided tour of Tokyo, including stops at the Ginza District, the Imperial Palace Plaza, and the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Building. You'll also take a tour through Shinjuku.
- Visit the Honda Welcome Center and see the world's most advanced humanoid robot.
- Enjoy a traditional Japanese tea ceremony, created for the nobility during Japan's medieval period. The tea ceremony became popular with Zen Buddhist monks and samurai warriors, who discovered that drinking tea improved meditation, health, and awareness. The *cha-no-yu* (hot water for tea) has four principles, including harmony, respect, purity, and tranquility.
- Take a walking tour of the Asakusa area and see the Tokyo Skytree and Asakusa Kannon Temple.

DAY 4: TOKYO

Today's Theme: Japanese Culture, Past and Present—Japan's culture is steeped in tradition—with a contemporary flare. Swords, dolls, tea ceremonies, ikebana, martial arts, origami, and geisha are all well-known symbols of the country's art and culture. As you'll learn, Tokyo is widely considered the cultural center of Japan, and is the location of numerous festivals and observances. This makes it the ideal setting for true cultural immersion.

- Practice your conversational Japanese in an interactive language lesson that focuses on Japan's cultural traditions.
- Visit the Meiji Shinto Shrine, dedicated to the deified spirits of Emperor Meiji and Empress Shoken, and explore the surrounding Shibuya District.
- Learn the secrets of art in Japan, a country whose art and culture are arguably more entwined than any other country in the world. Whether it is ikebana or origami, your art class will introduce you to beauty and harmony, seen with a Japanese perspective.

DAY 5: TOKYO

Today's Theme: Japanese Culinary Traditions—Like most aspects of Japanese culture, the country's culinary traditions are rooted in history and spirituality. For centuries, Japanese cuisine has been known for the combination of staple foods, like rice and noodles, and other flavorful dishes, known as *okazu*. As you'll taste for yourself, Japan is also known for having high-quality ingredients and presentation, helping it to earn more Michelin stars than the rest of the world combined.

- Explore the Tsukiji Fish Market, the largest of its kind in the world.
- Practice food-related vocabulary in an interactive language lesson.
- Try your hand at preparing authentic Japanese foods during a cooking class.

DAY 6: TOKYO

Today's Theme: Japanese Art—The history of Japanese art spans more than 12 millennia. In that vast period of time, artists of Japan have produced artwork of all shapes, sizes, and influences. Today, Japan is well known not only for its origami and ikebana, but also for its ceramics, calligraphy, and the more modern manga and anime. No matter the medium, Japanese art tends to be characterized by aesthetic concepts that have been refined over the centuries, giving it both a unique identity and a symbolic significance.

- Master art-related terms while practicing your conversational Japanese in an interactive language lesson.
- Visit the Suginami Animation Museum, dedicated to the art and technique of Japanese animation.
- Test your creativity at an anime drawing class. Anime, the art form of hand-drawn or computer animation, emphasizes art quality over movement and is characterized by vibrant color and fantasy.
- Take a walking tour of the Akihabara District, a cultural center for fans of anime and its comics counterpart, manga. See popular anime characters throughout shops and cafes in the area. The atmosphere is created intentionally to make passers-by feel as though they are within an anime production or a video game.

DAY 7: TOKYO

Today's Theme: Japanese History—Throughout history, the Japanese have revered and preserved the traditions of their ancestors. For this reason, Japan has a deep-rooted heritage that values the harmony of nature, architecture, and spirituality that has existed here for thousands of years.

- Visit the Tokyo National Museum.
- Explore Ueno Park, Japan's most popular urban oasis. In the spring, cherry blossoms appear all across the greenspace—along with locals practicing *hanami*, the Japanese custom of enjoying the ephemeral beauty of flowers.

- Learn history-related terms and practice your conversational Japanese in an interactive language lesson.
- Enjoy a homemade dinner with locals, the perfect opportunity to gain unique insight into life in Japan today.

DAY 8: TOKYO

Today's Theme: Daily Life in Japan—Imagine a world where the school year is 240 days (instead of 180 like in the U.S.). Or where people bow when apologizing, greeting, or thanking you. Welcome to the life of a typical Japanese citizen. Today is your chance to learn more about their world—where books are read from right to left and stop signs are triangular—and compare it to your own.

- Practice your conversational Japanese in an interactive language lesson that focuses on the country's unique culture.
- Participate in a cultural exchange activity with locals. Whether it's a trivia night, pick-up soccer game, a student-guided walking tour, or a community project, you'll hear about life in Tokyo and what it's like to call Japan home. Of course, Japanese locals will want to learn about life in the U.S., so be ready to answer their questions, too.
- Sing along with friends during a popular cultural night out in Japan: karaoke night! Unlike in the U.S., karaoke in Japan typically takes place in a private room with a small group. While English songs are always available, this is a great opportunity to show off your Japanese skills through music.

DAY 9: DEPART FOR HOME

Your tour may be coming to an end, but your lifelong love of the Japanese language is only beginning.
