
Day 1: Fly overnight to Japan

Day 3: Osaka

Experience the vibrant city of Osaka with your Tour Director. Visit the Osaka castle, a famous landmark surrounded by moats and gardens that's filled with Samurai history. Then, journey from past to present at the Game Center, where you can try arcade games, win souvenirs and witness the masters of these games in action. Make sure to try out the *purikura*, a Japanese photobooth, for a picture-perfect souvenir. Visit the Cup of Noodles Museum for a delicious and educational experience. Day 4: Osaka

Enjoy a guided excursion to Nara, a Japanese city that dates back to the 9th century. Explore the intricate and ancient temples and artwork there, and see Daibutsu, the world's largest bronze Buddha. Keep an eye out for the famous wild deer that roam freely in Nara Park. You'll also take an interactive Taiko drum lesson while learning about the history of the instrument.

Day 5: Osaka | Tokyo

Travel from Osaka to Tokyo on the legendary bullet train and pass the time learning to make origami with your Tour Director. Once you arrive in Tokyo, take a guided tour that includes a visit to Harajuku—a famous shopping district filled with colorful Japanese fashion. Right next to Harajuku, in a beautiful and peaceful park, is the Meiji Shrine. This historical display of traditional Japanese culture makes for a nice escape from the bustling city.

Day 6: Tokyo

Visit the Suginami Animation Museum to learn about the history of anime and manga in Japan, and participate in an animation workshop. Enter the immersive Edo-Tokyo Museum, and get a glimpse into life during the Edo era as you explore recreations of old-fashioned buildings, life-size models, and dioramas.

Day 7: Tokyo | Fuji-Hakone-Izu region

For a change of pace, take an excursion to the tranquil Hakone National Park. Cruise peaceful Lake Ashi and enjoy a photo stop at Mt. Fuji. Ride the cable car up to Mount Komagatake and take in the majestic panoramic views.

Day 8: Tokyo

Enjoy the peaceful Hama Rikyu Garden in the heart of the city. Visit the Asakusa Kannon Temple, the oldest temple in Tokyo. Then, take a relaxing water bus ride and float by the city sights. Discover Odaiba on your own, a popular shopping and entertainment district located on a man-made island in Tokyo Bay. Explore the many options—from relaxing beaches, to the Toyota Showcase to see the latest cars, or even a Ferris wheel ride. Enjoy an evening of karaoke in your own private group.
